Moderna and Johnson & Johnson are approved for those who are 18 years of age and older. Children 12 years of age and older are eligible for the Pfizer vaccine and a parent or guardian must accompany anyone under 18 years of age at this clinic.

Cayuga County Health Department is participating in the #VaxtoSchool campaign, which is program administered by New York State to target unvaccinated 12-17 year olds to get vaccinated. Any child in this age group who receives their **first or second dose Pfizer vaccine** beginning October 2, 2021 through November 19, 2021 at a Cayuga county Health Department vaccination clinic will be given a \$25 Amazon gift card. COVID19 is still a risk for individuals of all ages, including children and adolescents and getting vaccinated is the best way to protect yourself, friends, family and our school communities from the virus.
