BOIL WATER NOTICE

Sennett Residents served by the public water system in the following locations:

1. Weedsport-Sennett Rd between Turnpike Rd and the Village of Weedsport, including Shepherd Rd.
2. Turnpike Rd from Weedsport-Sennett Rd going west to the end of the public water line including Wards Rd.

BOIL YOUR WATER BEFORE USING

Bring tap water to a rolling boil, boil for one minute, and cool before using. Or use bottled water certified for sale by the New York State Department of Health. Boiled or bottled water should be used for drinking, making ice, washing dishes, brushing teeth, and preparing food until further notice.

This Boil Water Notice applies to the Town of Sennett residents who live at the locations described above.

What Happened?

On March 4, 2022, a section of main on Weedsport-Sennett Road and Turnpike Road lost pressure due to a water main break. When water mains lose pressure it increases the chance that untreated water and harmful microbes can enter your water.

Harmful microbes in drinking water can cause diarrhea, cramps, nausea, headaches, or other symptoms and may pose a special health risk for infants, some elderly, and people with severely compromised immune systems. But these symptoms are not just caused by microbes in drinking water. If you experience any of these symptoms and they persist, you should seek medical advice.

What is being done?

The repairs are being made and the Town will take samples to confirm there is no contamination in the water system. It is anticipated that the Boil Water Order will remain in effect through the weekend. The Health Department will notify residents of the Town's water system when they no longer need to boil their water.
