**DEPARTMENT UPDATES FOR COMMITTEE:**

**Steve Lynch (Planning & Economic Development) –**

**1. Owasco Lake Watershed Rules and Regulations Update Project**

**UPDATE:** A summary document providing responses to the ~37 pages of public feedback on the April 2019 Draft Regulations has been prepared. It will be presented to the WSRR Steering Committee, together with updated Final Proposed Regulations in February. Following Steering Committee review, the Public Response Summary Document and Final Draft Owasco Lake Watershed Regulations will be presented and transmitted to the Owasco Town Board and Auburn City Council at a joint meeting.

**2. Lake Ontario Resiliency & Economic Development Initiative (REDI)**

**UPDATE:** At the request of the State REDI Commission, Cayuga County and the Village of Fair Haven have submitted applications for municipal infrastructure resiliency projects to secure the balance of REDI funds available for projects in Cayuga County. In accordance with a January Legislature Resolution, Cayuga County requested transfer of REDI funds previously awarded for the Nine-Mile Bike Corridor, along with the addition of approximately \$1.4MM in available REDI funds, for construction of the new Nature Center Facility at Sterling Nature Center.

**3. Emerson Park Programming Plan**

**UPDATE:** Planning and Parks Department Staff will provide a second public presentation of the Emerson Park Programming Plan at 6:30PM on Thursday, February 6<sup>th</sup> at the Emerson Park Pavilion. Legislators are welcome and encouraged to attend as available.

**4. Erie Canal Trail & Re-watering Project (Town of Brutus & Cayuga County).**

**UPDATE:** All materials requested by NYS Parks (Grantor) needed for official transfer of the grant project to the County have been provided. Staff has been assigned to the project and we will proceed upon receipt and execution of official state grant contracts (previously authorized by County Resolution #141-19; dated 4-23-2019 accepting the grant).

**5. Staff to Cayuga County Development Corporation**

**UPDATE:** Please note that Planning Department staff to CCDC are currently working with the independent auditors (Bonadio & Co., CPAs) on the CCDC FY19 Financial Audit. Staff will prepare all required annual reporting to the NYS Authority Budget Office, due by April 1, 2020. Copies of the Annual CCDC financial audit will be submitted to the Chair of the Legislature and County Treasurer upon board approval.

**6. Sterling Nature Center Development**

**UPDATE:** Anticipating approximately \$4MM in State REDI Funds (~\$2.4MM for Building and \$1.6MM for Site/Parking/Trails), in addition to 2019 State CFA Funding Award for construction documents (\$231,525.00)

To proceed with facility development, a section of a Town of Sterling Road, currently connecting State Route 104 with the Facility and acting as the long entry drive into the facility from Route 104, will need to be abandoned by the Town and returning the land under the roadway to full County ownership. There have been productive and positive conversations between County staff and the Town Supervisor/Town Highway Superintendent regarding the need and benefit of the change. Parks and Planning staff are recommending that the appropriate authorizations be pursued via the March, 2020 legislature cycle is possible.

**Maureen Riester (Employment & Training) –**

- o During the month of January, Cayuga Works had 960 visitors – an average of 46 per day (21 working days).
- o Cayuga Works assisted with 3 recruitment events for 2 employers:
  - o 2020 Census recruited for 2 days and spoke with 40-50 potential employees.
  - o BCS held a recruitment event and hired 8 out of 15 attendees.
- o The Employment & Training team participated in OSOS (One Stop Operating System) training by the Department of Labor on January 9<sup>th</sup>. OSOS is the database used by all One-Stop Career Centers in NY.
- o Currently, there are 288 jobs posting for Cayuga County listed in the New York State Job Bank, which is the database the New York State Workforce Development system uses to centralize job postings for area employers. **Tracy Verrier (CEDA) –**

- o The first CNY Regional Economic Development Council meeting of 2020 was on January 21, 2020, which Tracy Verrier attended. The meeting primarily consisted of taskforce updates, updates about the first round of the Alliance for Economic Inclusion, and discussion about how to utilize remaining Upstate Revitalization Initiative funds.
- o Tracy Verrier also attended an informational session for businesses in relation to the Resiliency Economic Development Initiative, which includes a put of funding for businesses impacted by Lake Ontario flooding. The session covered the details of the application process and regulations related to the funding.
- o The next Startup Connect networking event will be at Lavish Lounge on February 10 at 5-7pm. This event is intended to connect entrepreneurs, small businesses, and small business service providers to each other and foster a more active entrepreneurial ecosystem.
- o CEDA’s Economic Forecast Luncheon was held January 16, 2020. Please see supplemental document for additional information.
- o Metrics through January 22, 2020:
  - o Existing businesses met with: 12 (including 2 first-time contacts)

**Doug Kierst (Soil & Water Conservation District) –**

- The Electric Services Agreement between the Cayuga SWCD and Cayuga County, to provide electricity to the County Facilities on County House Road, expires in July of 2020. I would like to request a meeting with the County to review the previous contract and discuss a potential future contract.
- Cayuga County SWCD Staff taught one (1) NYS DEC endorsed 4 hour training for contractors, municipal officials, engineers and other groups that may be interested in learning about erosion and sediment control methods. There are two (2) workshops scheduled in February on the 5<sup>th</sup> and the 19<sup>th</sup>. Additional information can be found on our website, [www.cayugaswcd.org](http://www.cayugaswcd.org).
- Cayuga County SWCD Staff met with the Town and Village of Moravia to discuss recommendations to address flooding concerns.
- Cayuga County SWCD Staff is in the process of completing Agricultural Value Assessments (Soil Group Worksheets) for County residents.
- Cayuga County SWCD Staff completed the stabilization of approximately 110 feet of shoreline along Owasco Lake.
- Cayuga County SWCD Staff completed the implementation of approximately 140 feet of rock lined channel in the Owasco Lake Watershed.

**Dan Welch (Director Cornell Cooperative Extension) –**

- CCE Cayuga is committed to working with County Parks and Trails/Ag. Museum and any other partners to hold the 4-H Youth Fair/Remember the Big 6 Picnic/ Cayuga County Fair on the last weekend in July 2020. Following this year’s fair there needs to be additional discussion/planning for the long-term organization and sustainability of such an event.
- Heather Whitten started as the new part-time 4-H STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math) educator on February 4<sup>th</sup>.
- Program Highlights
  - o 4-H Youth Development
    - o Produced in NY was held on January 11<sup>th</sup>. This event was co-sponsored by CCE Seneca County. 17 youth participated, and 5 will compete at the NYS Fair in August.

**AUTHORIZING THE CHAIR OF THE LEGISLATURE TO EXECUTE AN AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE COMMUNITY SCIENCE INSTITUTE AND CAYUGA COUNTY FOR IMPLEMENTATION OF THE FY 2020 CAYUGA LAKE STREAM MONITORING PROGRAM**

WHEREAS, the water quality of Cayuga Lake is important to Cayuga County and its residents; and

WHEREAS, the Cayuga Lake Watershed Restoration and Protection Plan 2017 recommends consistent monitoring of the lake and its tributaries as necessary for the restoration and protection of the Cayuga Lake Watershed; and

WHEREAS, Dr. Stephen Penningroth, of the Community Science Institute ("CSI"), has proposed a sampling program for tributaries of Cayuga Lake in Cayuga County for 2020 (the Project); and

WHEREAS, the total Project cost to the County is not to exceed \$22,000 with Planning & Economic Development Department's WQMA budget providing \$22,000 from FY 2020 budget item A87404-54059, which is specifically allocated for professional services and targeted research related to Cayuga Lake stream monitoring; and

WHEREAS, Cayuga County deems it to be in the public interest and benefit to enter into an agreement to conduct this stream monitoring on Cayuga Lake; and

WHEREAS, the CSI professional services proposal is considered a sole source procurement agreement for professional services in the context of the ongoing research and data collection conducted by Dr. Penningroth and CSI in Cayuga Lake and its major stream tributaries over a number of years; now, therefore be it

RESOLVED, by the Cayuga County Legislature as follows:

1. The Chair of the Legislature is hereby authorized and directed to sign such documents as may be necessary to implement this Project so long as contract costs do not exceed the proposed Project cost of \$22,000; and

**AUTHORIZING THE CHAIRMAN OF THE LEGISLATURE TO EXECUTE AN AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE FINGER LAKES INSTITUTE AND CAYUGA COUNTY FOR IMPLEMENTATION OF THE FY 2020 OWASCO LAKE AND STREAM MONITORING PROGRAM**

WHEREAS, the water quality of Owasco Lake is important to Cayuga County and its residents; and

WHEREAS, the Owasco Lake Watershed Management Plan recommended that the water quality of Owasco Lake and its tributaries be consistently and strategically monitored; and

WHEREAS, the Owasco Lake Watershed Management Council (OLWMC) was incorporated to bring specific focus to strategic plans and actions to improve and protect the water quality of Owasco Lake and created a Watershed Inspection Committee (WIC) under the OLWMC and charged the WIC with the responsibility to align data collection and lake monitoring with watershed inspection program efforts; and

WHEREAS, Dr. John Halfman, of the Finger Lakes Institute ("FLI"), has proposed an 2020 Owasco Lake, Stream and Drone Monitoring Program (the Project) which implements Owasco Lake monitoring initiatives in coordination with the work of the Owasco Lake Watershed Management Council and the Watershed Inspection Committee; and

WHEREAS, the total Project cost to County not to exceed is \$27,000 with Planning & Economic Development Department's WQMA budget providing \$20,500 from FY 2020 budget item A87404-54059 which is specifically allocated for professional services and targeted research related to Owasco Lake and Stream monitoring and the balance of \$6,500 allocated from FLOWPA funding budget item A87410 43994 which is allocated for drone monitoring and spectral imaging; and

WHEREAS, Cayuga County deems it to be in the public interest and benefit to enter into an agreement to conduct this lake, stream and drone monitoring on its main drinking water source; and

WHEREAS, the FLI professional services proposal is considered a sole source procurement agreement for professional services in the context of the ongoing research and data collection conducted by Dr. Halfman and the FLI on Owasco Lake and its major stream tributaries over a consecutive number of years; and

WHEREAS, Cayuga County is funding this Project on the behalf of, and as its contribution to, the Owasco Lake Watershed Management Council ("OLWMC"); now, therefore be it

RESOLVED, by the Cayuga County Legislature as follows:

1. The Chair of the Legislature is hereby authorized and directed to sign such documents as may be necessary to implement this Project so long as contract costs do not exceed the proposed Project cost of \$27,000; and
2. The County Treasurer is hereby authorized to make the journal and accounting entries necessary to accomplish the administration of the Project; and

WHEREAS, Cayuga County, as one of the twenty-five (25) voting members of the Water Resources Board of the Finger Lakes-Lake Ontario Watershed Protection Alliance (FLOWPA), has been allocated NYS Department of Environmental Conservation (NYSDEC) funds for its water quality program under the FLOWPA; and

WHEREAS, NYSDEC has agreed to transfer funding for the twenty-five (25) member programs to the Oswego County Soil and Water Conservation District (DISTRICT) via a single contract between NYSDEC and the DISTRICT; and

WHEREAS, the County of Cayuga is eligible to receive \$89,200.00 in State Fiscal Year (SFY) 2019-2020 FLOWPA funding, which will be used to enhance, protect and preserve Cayuga County’s water resources; and

WHEREAS, the Cayuga County Legislature wishes to execute the contracts necessary for the County to access and allocate these state funds for the preservation and protection of Cayuga County’s water resources; now, therefore be it

RESOLVED, that the Chair of the Cayuga County Legislature is hereby authorized and directed to execute a contract between Cayuga County and the Oswego County Soil and Water Conservation District for the FLOWPA funding as specified in said contract; and to act as the official representative of Cayuga County in connection with any and all contracts between Cayuga County and the Oswego County Soil and Water Conservation District for FLOWPA funds; and be it further

RESOLVED, that a signed, certified copy of this resolution be submitted to the District Manager of the DISTRICT along with said contracts; and be it further

WHEREAS, quality of the water in County lakes and streams is highly dependent on the manner of which stormwater runoff is managed; and

WHEREAS, stormwater runoff can pick up and transport a variety of substances that pollute receiving waters; and

WHEREAS, homeowners can minimize the negative impacts that can occur from stormwater from their properties; and

WHEREAS, the Cayuga County Nutrient and Sediment Working Group of the Cayuga County Water Quality Management Agency ("WQMA"), prepared the Residential Guidelines to Protect Water Quality in Cayuga County, a set of guidelines recommended for homeowners to follow in order to minimize the impact of stormwater from their properties, with such document being adopted by the WQMA and now attached hereto and made a part of this Resolution hereof; and

WHEREAS, the Cayuga County Legislature wishes to support and advance proactive residential actions that are protective of the County's diverse water resources, including the Residential Guidelines to Protect Water Quality in Cayuga County as prepared by the WQMA Nutrient and Sediment Working Group; now, therefore be it

RESOLVED, by the Cayuga County Legislature as follows:

1. The Cayuga County Legislature hereby approves and adopts countywide guidelines for protection of water quality at residential properties as outlined in the document titled "Residential Guidelines to Protect Water Quality in Cayuga County"; and
2. The Chair of the Legislature is hereby authorized and directed to transmit a copy of this Resolution, together with a copy of the Residential Guidelines to Protect Water Quality in Cayuga County to the chief elected officials of each municipality within Cayuga County, encouraging the adoption and implementation of these practices among all people.

# Residential Guidelines

## to Protect Water Quality in Cayuga County



### Introduction

The quality of the water in our lakes and streams is highly dependent on the manner in which stormwater runoff is managed. Stormwater runoff is rain or melting snow that instead of seeping into the ground flows over the surface and into a watercourse or waterbody. Along the way, runoff can pick up and transport a variety of substances that pollute receiving waters. These substances include:

- Sediment from construction sites and other areas stripped of natural vegetation;
- Oil, grease, metals, and coolants from cars, trucks, and other vehicles;
- Fertilizers, pesticides, and other lawn and garden care chemicals;
- Detergents used in the washing of vehicles and other items;
- Bacteria from pet wastes and poorly maintained septic systems; and
- Salt used to de-ice paved areas.

Pollutants deposited by stormwater runoff can damage habitat of aquatic plants and animals, negatively affect recreational uses of waterbodies, and degrade the quality of drinking water.

There is a potential for stormwater runoff to reach undesirable levels whenever land is developed, native vegetation is removed, surfaces are paved, and natural drainage patterns are disrupted.

This document presents a set of guidelines that homeowners can follow to minimize the negative impacts of stormwater runoff from their properties. They were drafted by the Nutrient-Sediment Working Group of the Cayuga County Water Quality Management Agency (WQMA) following many hours of research and discussion.

### Key Strategies

Seventeen guidelines that homeowners can follow to reduce water pollution are described in the following pages. But to remember four simple key strategies, think **L-A-K-E**:

**L**imit the area of lawns and impervious surfaces such as paved driveways and patios.

**A**void using fertilizer, car wash, and boat wash containing phosphorus. Avoid using pesticides except as a focused, last alternative.

**K**eep surface water runoff away from septic system leach fields and maintain septic systems according to Health Department recommendations.

**E**nhance infiltration of surface water runoff by maintaining vegetated buffers between lakeshores or watercourses and developed areas including lawns.



Owasco Lake in Cayuga County drains an area of 205 square miles and serves as the drinking water source for approximately 44,000 people.

# Recommendations for Property Owners to Improve Water Quality

## Minimize Runoff

1. Lawns absorb less rainfall than natural areas and do not provide sufficient water quality protection on shorefront lots. To protect water quality, the size of a lawn should be kept to a minimum. A property owner should replace part or all of their lawn, especially areas near the lake shore and streams, with trees, shrubs and groundcover.
2. Mowing height of lawns should be maintained at 3 ½ inches or higher to help slowdown and reduce runoff. In addition, lawns maintained at this height require less fertilizer and water to remain healthy.
3. Impervious surfaces, such as driveways, paved patios, and roofs, should not exceed 15% of the area of the property. No impervious surface should be located closer than 35 ft. from a lake or stream. Driveways and walkways should be porous or permeable.

## Capture and Infiltrate Runoff

4. A vegetated buffer of at least 35 ft., consisting of trees, shrubs, and groundcover, should be maintained between the lake shore or watercourse and the developed areas of the property, including lawns. A winding path should be used to obtain access to the shoreline

5. In the first 75 ft. from a stream or lake, the area should have a well-distributed stand of trees and other vegetation. Strive to have at least 1 tree per 100 sq. ft. of property. Contact Cornell Cooperative Extension (315-255-1183) or your local nursery for questions regarding the type of tree that would work well in your situation.

6. Property owners should try to encourage infiltration of stormwater by installing rain gardens and permeable walkways and driveways.

7. Basement sump pump outlets and roof drains should be directed to rain gardens or to rain barrels.



## Eliminate Pollutants

8. If you must fertilize your lawn, only use a lawn fertilizer that contains zero phosphorus.
9. Gardens should not be fertilized unless a soil test is completed prior to application to make sure it is needed.
10. When mowing your lawn, direct the clippings away from the lake, watercourses, and ditches.

11. Leaves and lawn clippings should be left in place. Leaves and lawn clippings not left in place following mowing should be composted. Aquatic weeds that may wash up on the shoreline should also be composted. Compost piles should be located at least 35 ft. from the lake or watercourses. Contact Cornell Cooperative Extension (315-255-1183) for information regarding creating and managing your compost pile.
12. Pesticides should be used only as a last alternative and their application should be focused, not broadcast. Contact Cornell Cooperative Extension (315-255-1183) for questions regarding pest management. If you must use pesticides, be sure to read and follow the label directions, especially in regards to maintaining the required distance from a stream or shoreline.
13. Pet waste should be picked up and disposed of in your trash.
14. Before you begin a construction project where soil will be disturbed, contact the

Cayuga County Soil and Water District (315-252-4171) for information on planning and implementing appropriate erosion prevention practices.

15. Septic systems recommendations –
  - A) Do not use a garbage disposal. Consider disposing of raw vegetable scraps in a compost pile.
  - B) Pump your septic tank every three years.
  - C) Divert surface water away from the leach field.
  - D) Minimize water discharged to the septic system.
  - E) Grease, oils, or fats should not be poured down your sink or toilet. Instead these substances should be thrown away in your household trash.
  - F) Septic tank additives are not helpful and may be harmful to your septic system.
  - G) Contact the Cayuga County Health Department (315-253-1405) for further information regarding septic systems.

16. When washing cars and boats, only phosphate-free car wash or boat wash detergent should be used. Cars or boats should only be washed while on a permeable grassed surface, not on a driveway or in the water.

17. Prescription drugs or over-the-counter medications including supplements should not be disposed of in the toilet or sink. Medications can be dropped off at the Auburn Police Department and the Cayuga County Sheriff's Office. In addition, residents are encouraged to check with your local pharmacy as many now accept unused medications.

WHEREAS, Capital "H" Project No.11-2 ( OWASCO FLATS WETLAND RESTORATION AND RIPARIAN BUFFERS INITIATIVE PROJECT) is funded with \$1,312,500.00 through two grants to construct the Owasco Flats Wetland Restoration and Riparian Buffers Initiative Project (the "Project") through the New York State Environmental Facilities Corporation's Green Innovation Grant Program (GIGP) via Cayuga County Resolutions #536-10, #316-11 and #212-17; and

WHEREAS, the firm Environmental Design & Research, Landscape Architecture, Engineering, & Environmental Services, D.P.C., Syracuse, NY ("EDR") was awarded the engineering services for the Project via Cayuga County Resolution #432-12; and
