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Vaccination Clinics

A walk-in vaccination clinic will be held Tuesday, September 14 at Moravia Fire Department, 38 Keeler St, Moravia, NY 13118 from 3pm-4pm. Both Pfizer and Moderna vaccines will be available.

A walk-in vaccination clinic will be held Wednesday, September 15 at Scipio Fire Department, 3550 NY-34, Scipio Center, NY 13147 from 3pm-4pm. Both Pfizer and Johnson & Johnson vaccines will be available.

Children 12 years of age and older are eligible for the Pfizer vaccine and a parent or guardian must accompany anyone under 18 years of age at this clinic.

Additional Information

Due to the extraordinarily high volume of COVID cases in Cayuga County, we want to make the public aware that there may be a 4 to 5 day lag in contacting people who have tested positive. We are working diligently as we identify school children and then address other cases from their date of test. Please do your part if you have tested positive and stay home until a tracer contacts you. If you self-tested with a positive result; keep the test, label the test with your name, date tested and date of birth and call the Health Department. We will put you in the queue to return your call. As always, seek professional health care if your symptoms merit.
