FOREWARD

The reason for this book is to recall the stories of sacrifices made by the men from Cayuga County, New York, who served their country during World War II. These men, in particular the 267 men who lost their lives in service, are the subject of this book which preserves their stories for future generations. A recent article in *Newsweek* magazine about the war in the Pacific illustrates this need, i.e. "...there are teenagers today so ahistorical in both Japan and the United States that they are unaware that Japan and the United States fought a war."

Men born in the first two decades of the 20th Century, who came of age during the Great Depression, answered their country's call to arms and measured up to the tasks they were asked to perform. It is now sixty-four years since America went to war. The veterans of the war, called the "Greatest Generation," are passing on at the rate of 1500 per day. It is important that their role in the world conflict, the dimensions of which have never been exceeded, not be forgotten.

They were young and came from every walk of life. They served in far-flung lands: the jungles and volcanic islands of the Pacific, the tundra of Alaska, the sands of North Africa, the mountains of Italy, the fields of France and Germany, here in the States, and in the skies above and on the seas around the world.

These were the men on whose shoulders fell the burden and the viciousness of combat with the enemy. As James Stokesbury summed it up in his book A Short History of World War II: "The whole world was locked in the throes of the greatest war ever seen and the future boiled down to thousands of young men in aluminum cylinders in the sky, steel compartments in the sea and holes in the ground."
